

Musical Arts Fund

The Musical Arts Fund provides support for the school's music programs, including its musical productions. Over the years, funds have been used to purchase sound equipment and technology for the music department and musicals, to rent lighting and equipment for special effects, and to cover the expense of securing the rights and scripts for musical productions. The fund also supports the work of the stage and sound crews with assistance from set design and sound engineering experts. Past musical productions have included Hadestown, Mamma Mia, Anything Goes, Grease, Hairspray and Gypsy. Planning is beginning for the spring 2026 musical.

Camp Pathfinder

A hallmark experience for all 8th graders is the annual trip to Camp Pathfinder. Located in Algonquin Provincial Park in Ontario, Canada, this four-day wilderness retreat provides our students with the opportunity to develop an appreciation for natural history and to grow together as a class from the shared experience of exploring the outdoors, free of electronic devices.

The students participate in a number of structured, guided activities including hiking, canoeing, confidence course, art and forestry skills. There are a number of aspects of the trip that directly relate to the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program at City Honors. The expected outcome is that the students come back with a sense of the world in relation to personal identity, environmental stewardship and cultural awareness.

The CH/FMP Foundation provides support to the 8th grade class to help ensure that all students can attend the trip to Camp Pathfinder if they wish to do so, regardless of whether or not is it within a family's budget to afford the cost. Last year, 25 students received full or partial scholarships to attend the trip with their classmates.
