While we are excited to have our students back, we are saddened by the additional loss of precious life and trauma our city has endured during the recent blizzard. Hopefully this newsletter finds your family well and in good spirits. We will start the day on Tuesday with a moment of reflection on the lives that have been lost during the storm and a reminder to all students how to connect with help at CHS if they ever find themselves in crisis. Despite an incredibly difficult 2022 for our city, the energy and dedication of our students keeps us optimistic for the future.

Special thanks to CHS Chief Engineer, Mr. Cruz-Rodriguez, and custodian, Mr. Chesson, who slept in our school building for two nights during the storm to keep the building heated and all systems running properly. Despite the fact that the building did suffer some damage to our roof, soffits, parapets, gym floor and some other miscellaneous damages, the damage would have been far worse if it were not for the efforts of these gentleman and the rest of our facility care team at CHS. We are indebted to them for the commitment they have to this campus. The district's Chief Operating Officer, Mr. Hills, has been in communication with Dr. Kresse and provided assurances that the district is moving quickly to make short and long repairs to our building utilizing State emergency funds.

Families should remember that traffic around the city is always delayed as we restart after a school holiday. Please plan to get an early start to the day in order to reduce the stress of rushing to the bus or school.

CHS Speech and Debate Team Update

Your City Honors Speech and Debate team hosted a virtual tournament during on 11.19.22, despite the wintry conditions in the area, and earned a PREFECT score for the first time ever; easily placing 1st in team awards while competing against 6 other schools.

In JV Lincoln Douglas Debate, Amber Fleahman placed 2nd, while Christian Bagby earned 3rd place. In JV Public Forum Debate, the team of Ahmed Nazir & Sahil Ahmed won the silver medal, while Sascha Westermann and Oscar Calipari took 3rd place.

In the category of Varsity Lincoln Douglas, it was a clean sweep for CHS with senior captain Ciah Courtney, Salimata Sylla and Max Riley Pasciak placed 1, 2, 3! With the 2nd place finish, Salimata also became fully qualified for the State Tournament in April. In Varsity Public Forum Debate, CHS swept the podium again with the teams of Amelia and Charlotte Colder, Julia Eagan and Zach Biniszkiewicz, and Liam Cobb and Jake Baldwin earning gold, silver and bronze, respectively.

In the speech categories, senior captain Liam Rio, Faith Floyd, and Sophia Bensch placed 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in Dramatic Interpretation. In the category of Varsity Oral Interpretation, senior captain Phoebe Lawton placed 1st overall and qualified for the State Tournament, while Lauren Foster placed 2nd and Dani Peffer took 3rd. Finally, in Original Oratory, Annika Wilewicz placed 1st overall an earned an important half qual point!

On December 10, 2022 the City Honors Speech and Debate team participated in its largest local tournament this year, competing against 10 schools with over 50 student competitors, and placed 1st in Team Sweepstakes! 16 of our 20 students who competed walked away with a medal!

In the Speech category of Dramatic Interpretation, Sophia Bensch placed 1st, while Tim Tidd took home the silver medal in his first tournament of the year. Annika Wilewicz continued her hot streak, placing 1st in Original Oratory and qualifying for April's State Tournament.

In Novice Lincoln Douglas, Amber Fleahman finished 1st, and thus qualifying for the State Tournament, while Genevieve Harris took home the silver medal. In the category of Intermediate Lincoln Douglas Debate, Akoul Yak placed 2nd and Zaima Islam finished in 3rd place. Finally, in Varsity LD, senior captain qualified for the State Tournament taking 1st place, while Max Riley Pasciak took home the bronze medal.

It was another clean sweep for CHS in Novice Public Forum Debate as Fahim Rahman and Hasan Jamil earned 1st place, Sahil Ahmed and Ahmed Nazir finished 2nd, while Oscar Calipari and Sascha Westermann brough home the bronze medal. In IPFD, Tiahnee Porter and Madoka Aldstadt finished in 2nd place and Nathan Lloyd and Aidan Becker placed 3rd. Finally, in VPFD, Zach Biniszkiewicz and Julia Eagan took home the silver medal, while Liam Cobb and Jake Baldwin finished 3rd in the category.

The team now has 5 students completely qualified for the state tournament, with another 11 only needing one more top place finish to qualify! Congrats to another dominating team win!

- Participate in Career Awareness Workshops, College Tours and Field Trips
- Earn credit hours for local Community Service Projects
- Compete for stipends and scholarships
- Receive Free Metro Passes with unlimited service on evenings and weekends
